Richardson, with the able assistance of Ev Krahn, Irwin Wright and Elsie Hunter, laid claim to the Regina berth in the provincial final in the minimum number of games, five. But what was especially impressive was that only once did the opposition survive past the ninth end?

The game that did go the full distance, and then some, was against Lorne Hamblin of the Tartan in the A-side semis. The tense struggle didn't seem to leave any scars on Sam, though. He went out a couple of nights later and demolished Randy House of the Tartan 8-2 in eight ends in the first game of the A-B final

final.

In all, Richardson and his Regina club rink outscored the opposition 46-17 over the course of the five games.

The opposition for the Regina four in the opening round tonight at 8 will be supplied by one of the following: Len Kirkpatrick of Lafleche, Roert Clark of Carlyle, Larry Kreklewich of Meiville, Robert Kopp of Humboldt, Barry Haddy of North Battleford, Drio-Coverett of Melfort or Bernie Ydzdepski of Saskatoon.

Of course, the other time he was in it he won it. That was in 1973 when Glen Hall was second instead of Wright. The rink had a good run at the Canadian title

in Charlottetown, P.E.I., but wound up in second spot with a record of 8-2. That year, Richardson had to beat a fellow by the name of Ken May in the provincial final. This year, May made it to the provincial men's showdown.

"I wondered then when we were going to hear about May in men's curling," Richardson says. "This year we found out. Actually, there were a lot of good teams at the final in '73. I remember Paul Palendat was there and there was that Craig fellow from Saskatoon."

One rock tosser of note who was perhaps expected to make it to the mixed final but didn't though, is Garnet Campbell of Avonlea. He was the defending provincial champ twice over.

Draws Friday are set for 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., and on Saturday at 1:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. The first game of the A-B final is planned for 8:30 a.m. Sunday and the second game, if required, for 1:30 p.m. It isn't tough to figure out who the curing buffs in North Battleford will be rooting for, Haidey, of course. In fact, Haidey and host city backers Linda Kilboran, Barry Walker and Janice Shary will likely be considered the favorities even if they do meet Sam in the opener.
